Yes, they brought their cameras!



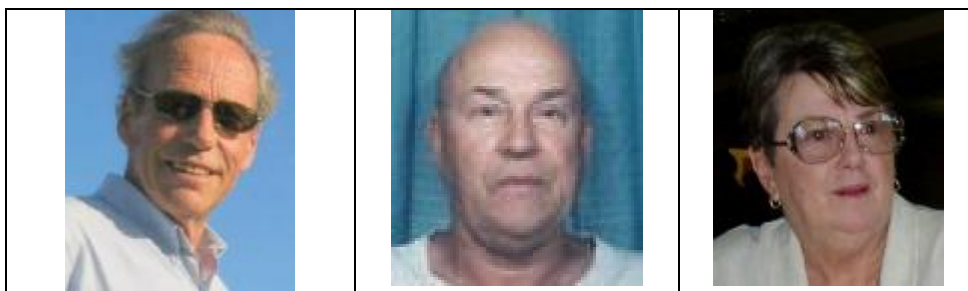
ASCCA participated in the National E-Security Awareness Week and held events in Sydney, Ipswich and Cooranbong.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Covering the period 1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008

It is with pleasure that I present my report to the 7th Annual General Meeting of the Australian Seniors Computer Clubs Association. We began as an incorporated association in 1998 and became a company limited by guarantee in 2001. The year 2008 has marked our 10th Anniversary. *ASCCA* has become a catalyst to enthuse, encourage, empower and assist seniors to explore the satisfaction and advantages of using computer technology.

The network of *ASCCA* clubs has spread to every state of Australia and it has been estimated that more than 122,000 seniors have been helped to become computer literate. This has been achieved because of the dedication and commitment given by volunteer management committee members and trainers in seniors computer clubs and organisations throughout Australia. One of the strengths of the *ASCCA* network is that each of our member clubs and organisations is autonomous.

ASCCA has never received core funding from Government but we have successfully sought project funding from government departments, philanthropic trusts and corporate bodies. Virtually dollar by dollar we have managed to cover our expenses, events, salaries (we have the equivalent of 2 full time employees), etc. We are extremely grateful to our sponsors and are conscious of our responsibilities to both members and sponsors. We always endeavour to make those precious dollars stretch to gain the greatest benefit for seniors and seniors computer clubs.

Without pre-planning this year has evolved as one of international significance for *ASCCA*. In July IBM Australia brought a delegation of Chinese officials to Sydney for a very short research tour to ascertain how Australia helped their older residents. They were particularly interested to know if there was use of technology by older people. *ASCCA* was requested to organise a seminar to provide the information the delegation sought. Computer Pals for Seniors Northern Beaches hosted the very successful event with the support of IBM Australia.

ASCCA successfully sought funding from the Department of Veterans' Affairs to help the John Newton Memorial Legacy Computer Club at Dee Why, NSW, to purchase new equipment. Part of the acquittal was to collect stories from the Legacy War Widows indicating just how important learning to use a computer had been to them. So many stories were written and creatively prepared that a 72 page book was produced. It was launched in August 2007.

August was also the month of our 9th Australian Computer Conference for Seniors. It was held at the Powerhouse Museum in Sydney and was to have been opened by Her Excellency Professor Marie Bashir AC CVO, Governor of New South Wales but at the last minute she was unable to attend but sent us a wonderful message to open the event. Representatives from some 50 different clubs and every state of Australia made it truly a national conference.

The Minister for Communications, Information Technology and the Arts, Senator the Hon. Helen Coonan, launched the NetAlert - Protecting Australian Families Online national education campaign in August. Brisbane Seniors Online hosted the

Queensland launch. Olympian Kieran Perkins proved to be a wonderful ambassador for the program.

Joan Craymer has co-ordinated a manual, *Memories Wishes and Gratitude* to showcase the Creative Writing winning and selected entries. Joan is also the *ASCCA* Newsletter Editor.

The Information Society and the Elderly: Global Perspectives Conference was held at Yonsei University, South Korea in February 2008. This conference was co sponsored by Microsoft and Nan Bosler was invited to attend and present at the conference. She was the only delegate from Australia. Strong international links were forged with delegates from several countries. One outcome is the display of photographs taken by South Korean Seniors which will be shown at this meeting and published on our website. We cannot speak each other's language but we can use photographs as a Bridge of Friendship. South Korea has requested that we share some of our winning photographs with them.

St. Valentine's Day was also Microsoft Citizenship Day. *ASCCA* had the opportunity to have a stand and talk with many Microsoft staff about the work that *ASCCA* does and how they could help us. Margaret Tucker and Nan Bosler attended and welcomed the opportunity to talk with the Minister, Linda Burney and John Galligan from Microsoft.

Many clubs in New South Wales organised and ran events to mark Seniors Week and *ASCCA*, in partnership with DADHC, organised three major events. Morisset was the venue for an expo hosted by Westlakes Seniors Computer Club and organised by Annette Stuckey (*ASCCA* Director). Mt. Pritchard proved to be an excellent location for a second expo which was organised by staff working closely with the local Fairfield Council and Joan Craymer (*ASCCA* Director). This expo built on the work that David Bennett (*ASCCA* Director) and Brian Hindes (Northern Beaches Trainer) had been doing in the area with digital photography workshops.

The third event was a Family History Festival hosted by Computer Pals for Seniors Northern Beaches. It was a standing room only event! Nan Bosler and David Bennett represented *ASCCA* and the manual, *People and Places: Tracing your Family History*, written by Nan Bosler and members of the club was launched.

The Telstra Connected Seniors grant program was the big story of the year. Telstra announced a series of grants available over a period of three years to clubs throughout Australia to enable them to introduce and train their members on the use of mobile phone and the internet. It was a very timely announcement as our survey of clubs clearly showed that your members were asking not only for a simple phone but for training on how to use and make the most of their mobile phones. Many clubs have already made successful submissions for the grants which range from \$1,000 to \$5,000. If your club is not aware of this opportunity make sure that you find out about the next round of grants – probably early in 2009.

In April 2008 **ASCCA** became a Telstra Connected Seniors National Grant Partner. Nan Bosler negotiated the submission and subsequent agreement while Diane Brentnall did initial planning to introduce the program to member clubs. Sirkka Duncan joined the **ASCCA** team to begin the training which started with a series of 8 workshops to trial the modules. Train the Trainer Workshops are now being held or planned for every state of Australia. The program is also assisted by all **ASCCA** staff.

ASCCA was invited to join the steering committee for National e-Security Awareness Week which culminated in a week of events in June 2008. We were delighted to successfully submit for one of the Commonwealth Government grants to run events during that week. To mark the week we updated the **ASCCA** e-Security manual and distributed it to all financial clubs. This manual is available in full on the **ASCCA** website. Expos and seminars were held in Sydney, Lake Macquarie and Ipswich.

In June Nan Bosler travelled as the Apia Adult Learning Australia Ambassador to Montevideo, Uruguay for an international seminar, *Women in motion for the right to education*. The seminar was organised by The International Council for Adult Education (ICAE) and run by it's Gender and Education Office (GEO). This meeting was an opportunity for women from around the world who work in Youth and Adult Education to get together, embark on an analysis and define strategies for the participation of GEO at the Sixth UNESCO International Conference on Adult Education (CONFINTEA VI) in Brazil in May 2009.

ASCCA is represented on several Telecommunication Councils including Telstra Consumer Consultative Council, Communications Alliance Consumer Council and the Consumers' Telecommunication Network. We welcome opportunities to speak at their events.

By necessity the members of **ASCCA**'s Board have to be willing to put in many volunteer hours so that we can meet our objectives. All staff and board members work as a team and we have melded together to form an effective and friendly entity.

Directors and staff have accepted many opportunities to do presentations at conferences, seminars and clubs.

It has been quite an exhausting but satisfying year and I am indebted to my board colleagues and our staff for the pleasing results for the year.

ASCCA is growing stronger year by year and that is because of the work and vision that we share.

Income Statement.

The total income received for the financial year was \$165,752.00 made up as follows:

This was down on the previous year by \$5,625.00

The Total expenses for the last financial year were \$164,848.00 as compared to \$168,422.00 for the previous year; down by \$3,574.00

Our net profit to 30th June 2008 was \$904.00 as compared to previous year of \$2,977.00. In the financial year to June 2008 we made a provision of \$2,777.00 for Leave pay which was not necessary in the previous year. Had we not done this we would have shown a profit of \$3,681.00. Although we have increased our staff we have managed to keep our expenses steady.

Balance Sheet

Assets:

Cash on Hand. At the 30th June we had \$122,502.00 in our cheque and Cash Management Accounts as compared to \$125,451 in the previous year.

Prepayments were \$4,654.00. This was mainly amounts paid in advance for the 10th Conference.

Sundry Debtors: \$33,092.00 This was mainly amounts for Grants to be received for the 10th Conference.

Liabilities:

The main item in Liabilities was Payments in Advance of \$92,587.00 which was for unused Grants and Donations carried forward into the current year. In addition we made provision for Leave Pay. Trade Creditors and Accruals were \$4,605.00

Our Total Equity of retained profits is \$77,815.00.

Seniors Week

ASCCA's Seniors Week events are usually held where the level of recognition is need to be raised either for established clubs or new ventures. This year events were held at Northern Beaches, Westlakes (Cooranbong) and Mt Pritchard.

National e-Security Week

Events were held in the week from 6th to 13th June, 2008, at 280 Pitt St., Lake Macquarie and Ipswich. All three events were well attended. An updated e-Security Manual and CD was produced and distributed to all financial clubs. These events were sponsored by the Commonwealth Government.

Conference 2008

Planning for the 10th Annual **ASCCA** conference took up a considerable amount of time during the period of this report. The conference was held again this year at the Powerhouse Museum. It's an excellent venue for this size of event and being centrally located attracts the most members. Attendance overall for both days was 172. The content mix was better this year but late and inadequate advertising kept the attendance to less than expected.

Product Sales:

Products sales for the year included Deep Freeze, Take the Teacher Home, Professor Teaches software. There are now 154 Deep Freeze licences registered through **ASCCA**.

Raffle 2008

The response to year's raffle was down slightly on last year. Of the books issued 164 books were returned as sold.

Competitions

The number of entrants for the competitions was similar to last year. No significant change.

Training

Training CD's were sent to all financial clubs at the end of last year. This will be repeated once the manuals have all been updated for Vista and Office 2007.

Train the Trainer training on mobile phones has been provided with sponsorship from Telstra. See Sirkka's report for details.

Club Movements

There have been 15 new clubs joined this year. After resignations the total number of financial clubs now stands at 124. Most of the new clubs are interstate, increasing the national aspect of *ASCCA*.

Blog

Blog activity has been a little sporadic, but we try to bring to members attention events and news that needs to be quickly distributed. 39 new entries were posted in the last 12 months. The blog with the most "hits" was "Convert Word 2007 Documents to Word 2003" with 2209 hits. The blog site received 4878 hits last year.

Annual Report: Margaret Tucker, Development Officer (Webmaster)

During 2007-08, maintenance and development of the *ASCCA* website was my principle focus. My hours had been reduced to 14 per week earlier in 2007, I also had a period of hospitalization requiring about a month off work, and spent three months (April to July) overseas. During this period, Colin Ward undertook essential tasks such as loading newsletters and important announcements, but otherwise the work was planned around my unpaid leave. So essentially, I worked 8 months of the 12. During the year I worked from home rather than the office.

During 2008, many existing club webpages were redesigned to complement the 2006 redesign of the *ASCCA* website. Every new club also received a webpage.

Special event websites were created as usual. These were for:

- Ø *ASCCA*'s 9th conference (September 2007)
- Ø Seniors Week (April 2008)
- Ø National e-Security Week (June 2008).

The webmaster's role is to ensure that information is available as quickly as possible on the website, and thus requires constant communication with the president and with other staff team members. Although working at home, this has been effectively handled by email and phone. Overheads, apart from wages have been minimal.

Sirkka Duncan OAM, Development Officer (Training)

Date: 15th April 2008 to 30th June, 2008

This report is to give a general overview of the beginning and progress of the TCS program until June 30.

The aim of the TCS program is to educate seniors in the potential of modern mobiles. Among seniors there is a view that the main function of a mobile phone is primarily to make phone calls without necessarily considering the extensive functions of current mobile phones. There is also a fear among some who lack confidence in their ability to fully use or understand mobiles. The TCS strategy is to change these perceptions by educating club trainers who pass on their increased knowledge to their peers i.e. other computer club members.

An eight session course was held in Sydney to assess how best to structure the workshops. These were made up of two hour weekly sessions comprised of six mobile use modules and two internet use modules. The aim was to gain an understanding of how best to run the training by observing the effectiveness of the course as it proceeded. At the same time for participants to gain a greater appreciation of how to use their mobiles including the less well known functions and to offer a brief overview of the internet. Club trainers were encouraged to institute training programs in their individual clubs after attending the workshop. Telstra Connected Seniors pilot workshop of 8 sessions started 29th April was completed 24th of June, the participants were mostly from the now defunct COTA Seniors Computer Club. The 14 participants were made up from both learners and trainees, the role of the trainees and the learners requiring different participation in the group.

4 trainees from 3 clubs (*2 from Carrington Computer Club for Seniors, 1 from Computer Pals for Seniors Concord and 1 from COTA Club*) having varied levels of understanding of their phone functions, attended all mobile phone workshops. The topics covered were; Introduction to Mobile Phones 1 & 2, Introduction to Text Messaging (SMS), Personalising your Mobile Phone 1 & 2 and Taking Photos and Videos with your Mobile Phones, Predictive text.

On a personal basis I feel that I have settled into the project well, considering that I came to it at a very short notice before the start of the initial 8 week pilot course starting April 29, 2008. The course allowed me to familiarise myself with different training modules as I prepared the PowerPoint notes week by week. This report covers the activities till June 30. Since that time there has been ongoing development of the program, additional workshops held and generally the program has been established on a more solid footing to allow for possible further developments.
